Point Isabel Tex., Feb. 27.—Chief  
Officer Baker of the British steam-  
ship Maristow arrived here at 10 a.  
m., in an open boat with four men,  
having left his ship on the 21st. In-

## FOUND THE NORTH POLE.

St. Petersburg Feb. 13.—Telegrams  
received today from Irkutsk, Sibe-  
ria, says a Siberian trader named  
Kouchnareff, who is the agent of  
Fredrik Nansen, the Norwegian ex-  
plorer, who sailed in the Fram June  
24th, 1893 for the arctic regions, has  
received information to the effect  
that Dr. Nansen has reached the  
North pole, has found land there, and  
is now returning towards civiliza-  
tion. In April last the Figaro of  
Paris circulated a rumor that Dr.  
Nansen had found the North pole  
and that it is situated on a chain of  
mountains. It was added he had  
planted the Norwegian flag there.  
The story was generally regarded as  
without foundation. On September  
17, last year advices received at Lon-  
don from a Danish trading station of  
Angmagssalik on the east coast of  
Greenland that a ship supposed to be  
Dr. Nansen's had been sighted at end
